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PURPOSE

This research project seeks to build a wider awareness of the extensive work by Czech composers and trumpeters during the Communist period of Czechoslovakia. This investigation includes historical discussion of the development of Czech trumpet music, profiles of selected Czech trumpet soloists, and an exploration of what makes this music "Czech".

CZECH TRUMPET STYLE



The old trumpeters played with a beautiful style, very lyrically and melodically. Even in the greatest fortissimos they did not play very hard or aggressively. They played lyrically and beautifully. I am talking about the trumpeters from the Czech Philharmonic. In this genre, there is an inherent special Czech MELODIOUSNESS, which has been abandoned in recent years.

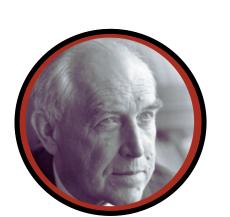
